Aims:

- ✓ Student will be able to speak fluently by giving their opinions while gossiping
- ✓ Student will use vocabulary related to business environment by describing their role in the activity
- ✓ Student will be able to recognize expressions to share secrets by performing role play activity

Language Skills:

- ✓ Speaking: asking and answering during activity
- ✓ Reading: role card and guideline
- ✓ Listening: authentic conversation from a short video clip; conversation between students

Language Systems:

- ✓ Lexis: work place vocabulary
- ✓ Phonology: rhythm and stress when giving important information
- ✓ Discourse: expressions to use for telling a secret or registering surprise

Assumptions:

Student already:

- ✓ Have direct/indirect working experience, familiar to office environment

Anticipated Errors and Solutions:

- ✓ Ss may not understand what contents the video clip has
 → subtitle will be displayed at the first time and replay if needed
- If the time is short,
 - \rightarrow skip the wrap up(discussion on positive effect of gossip)
- ✓ If Ss finish their tasks on worksheet earlier than anticipated,
 - → Play a game called 'gossip game'

Time	Set Up	Student Activity	Teacher Talk
10 mins	Whole class	Ask the learners if any of them has work experience in an office.	Hello everyone. How are you doing today? <u>Eliciting</u> Have they ever been to an office party? What was it like? Do you think it's a good idea to have parties where they work?
		Show students TV show called 'the office' to give them some ideas about what office party looks like.	Okay, let me show you what the office party looks like. To help you get some idea, I want you to watch one of popular TV show called 'The Office'. Did anyone watch this before? Well, let's watch a short video clip.
		Ask how it was and ask what the characters in the show did.	(Played the video clip) <u>CCQ</u> How was it? Well, the characters on the show is quite exaggerated, actually that is the fun fact of this show for the reason people enjoyed. What did they do at the party?
			Have any of you been to social events with the people they work with? In American or European company, the office party is pretty common for special day, such as Christmas, Halloween or Easter day. I had some of it when I worked and there were snacks and drinks the company prepared and employees just had chat and had some fun. It was mostly for refresh in the middle of the work day.

Time	Set Up	Student Activity	Teacher Talk
10 mins	Whole class	Tell the class that they have all been invited to an office end of the year party. Each person will have a different role. The objective of the role play is to find out as much gossip about the company as possible.	Instruction I am going to give a role card to each of you and it says your character in the office. With this, what we are going to do is to have an office party and you are invited. So, what we will do is to gossip.
			(write down 'gossip' and its meaning on the board)

Make sure you explain a word 'GOSSIP'.	Does anyone know a word 'gossip'? If you gossip with someone, you talk informally, especially about other people's private affairs behind them. You can also say that two people gossip.
Before students begin the role play, tell them that you want them to follow guidelines each time they talk to someone new.	And in the role play, let's suppose that the president of the company is not in the role play, so you are free to gossip about work and complain about the president too.
	When you gossip, please make sure to follow the instructions. First, introduce yourself and greet the other person. And refer to expression in Appendix B, ask some questions to make small talk. When you listen to the other person's gossip and react, please refer to the expressions in Appendix B.

10mins	Whole class	When students are ready, give out the role cards, tell them to start mingling.	I will give you 10 mins and let's get started with greetings and self-introduction.
		Circulate and take notes of language errors good use of the target language, but don't correct at this point.

5 mins	Whole class	When the time is up, ask what they find out.	Sounds like everyone enjoy the party. How was your conversation going? What do you find out? (Students tell what they heard about)
		Write down new vocabulary that students use in the conversation.	I heard some new vocabulary and expression we can use in the office: debt, be laid off, secretary, accountant, Human Resources, etc. 'I know this isn't the time to talk about it, but', 'Well, I heard that', 'please don't tell anyone I told you',

	'Listen to what I have to say, because I am not going to say it again'
Wrap up with the positive effect of gossiping.	Every workplace has gossip, there's no way to avoid it. When we typically think of the word "gossip", there seems to be a negative connotation that comes along with it. But gossip doesn't always necessarily have to be a bad thing because it also creates an environment where people can't, don't or won't openly and freely express themselves.

SOS Activity (in case you finish more quickly than you thought)

Materials:

Time	Set Up	Student Activity	Teacher Talk
10 mins	Whole class	Play 'Gossip Game'. Explain to the players how to play.	We are going to have an activity called 'gossip game' and it may not sound like but it is just for fun and there is no winner or loser.
			Instruction Let me give each of you a slip of paper. There is one phrase for you. Everyone do not see other's paper and make sure you are the only one know that phrase. Start from the left and we are going to switch the role. The first player whispers the phrase to the next person and the next person whispers her thought about what she just heard, and so on the line. The last person repeats what he/she heard through people. Then the first person tells the group what the phrase actually was.
			ICQ(Instruction checking question) Emily, who are you going to tell your phrase?
			(students play the game)
		Explain the point of the game.	The beauty of this game was to demonstrate how information can get distorted as it passes from person to person. That is why gossiping mostly has a negative perception for its truth distortion.

You know that the President has a serious problem with alcohol and likes to have parties in his office late at night. You also know that he had an affair with the last secretary.

Expressions to use: Please don't tell anyone I told you...

ROLE CARD

You are Patricia Mendez. You are a computer technician.

You know that the President's last secretary left because she was secretly pregnant. You don't know who the father was.

Expressions to use: Well, I heard that...

ROLE CARD

(Choose your own name and job before you start)

You work for the company. You don't like your job very much. You like to complain about your work and want to find out gossip about the company.

ROLE CARD

You are Malcolm Singh, the accountant. You know that the company is very much in debt and that the President is getting a very large financial bonus this year.

Expressions to use: You may not believe this but...

ROLE CARD

You are George Griffith, the Human Resources manager.

You know that ten people are going to be laid off in January because of financial problems with the company.

Expressions to use: I know this isn't the time to talk about it, but...

ROLE CARD

You are Bernie Takana. You are a visitor to the company and have been invited to the party. You know that your company is planning to buy out this company next year.

Expressions to use: I'm telling you this in confidence...

ROLE CARD

(Choose your own name and job before you start)

You work for the company. You don't like your job very much. You like to complain about your work and want to find out gossip about the company.
